This Black History Month, North West Migrants Forum is bringing together a month-long programme exploring Black heritage, education, leadership, racial justice, belonging and community.

Under the theme Learning, Leadership, Justice and Belonging, the programme goes beyond celebrating Black history to ask what we can learn from the past to address challenges facing our communities today: from racism and inequality to misinformation, online hate and division.

Through conferences, educational discussions, community conversations, culture, food, storytelling and celebration, we will bring together communities, educators, policymakers, public institutions, academics and international voices to share knowledge, strengthen relationships and explore how we can build a fairer and more inclusive future.

From Commitment to Action: Building Fairer & More Inclusive Public Institutions

16 October 2026 | 10am to 3pm | Belfast

As Northern Ireland becomes increasingly diverse, misinformation around migration, housing, faith and community safety can fuel stereotypes, mistrust and division.

This event, taking place in the Indian Community Centre, Belfast, will bring together representatives from government, housing, policing, faith communities, racialised communities and civil society to explore how public institutions can build greater trust and belonging. Discussions will address housing and migration myths, integration, freedom of religion, community safety, hate crime and confidence in policing.

Commonwealth & Empire: Recognition, Rights and Redress | One-hour session

A dedicated session to explore the Windrush Compensation Scheme and its relevance to people from across Commonwealth backgrounds. It will challenge the perception that Windrush is exclusively a Caribbean story while providing practical information on eligibility, rights, compensation and access to support.

Beyond Division: Leadership, Truth and Belonging in an Age of Online Hate

**Cross-Border Policy Conference
22 October 2026 | 10am to 2pm | Derry**

Bringing together policymakers, academics, elected representatives, civil society and anti-racism advocates from across the island of Ireland, this conference will examine the growing impact of online racism, misinformation and intimidation on Black and minoritised communities.

Drawing on international perspectives and lived experience, discussions will explore leadership and representation, online hate, institutional responsibility, community solidarity and practical policy responses. The programme will include learning from Howard University alongside voices from policing, justice and human rights.

The conference, being held in Derry's historic Guildhall, aims to move from conversation to action, identifying practical recommendations for policy, institutional practice and cross-border cooperation.

Our Annual Black History Month Summit will bring educators, communities and leaders together to explore Black history, racial justice and the transformative role of education.

We are delighted to welcome Professor Wayne A. I. Frederick of Howard University as keynote speaker, bringing an international perspective on education, leadership and racial equity.

The Summit, being held in the Ulster Museum, will also have a strong practical focus for educators, with two interactive workshops designed to build teachers' knowledge and confidence in teaching Black history in the classroom. The sessions will explore approaches to introducing Black history across the curriculum, developing educators' own understanding, addressing difficult or sensitive topics, and using inclusive resources to support meaningful learning.

Belfast**

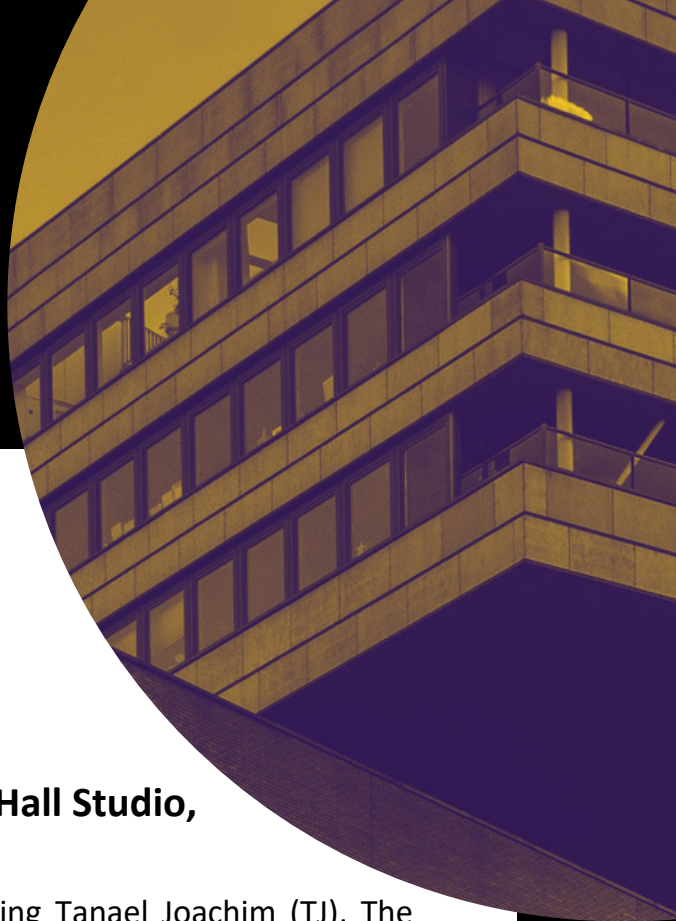
An evening of comedy and storytelling featuring Tanael Joachim (TJ), The Alien Everywhere.
